Subject: EXXON Compliance Meeting (EXXON, 2991 Hopwood Rd, Pleasanton, Alameda Co.)

A meeting was held between Exxon Representative, Pleasanton Fire dept., Alameda Co. public Health Dept., and the RWQCB.

The status of cleanup activities at the referenced site were discussed and the following points and concerns were discussed:

1. RWQCB's main concern at the site remains the potential of pollution emanating from the site contaminating the Muni well aquifer. To Date, only intermittent trace amounts of hydrocarbons have been observed in GW analyses from the deep well. At this time, the pollution at the site therefore does not appear to pose an immediate threat to water quality in the Muni well aquifer.

2. The extraction system at MW-7 has been shut down due to a lowering of water levels in the shallow water-bearing zone. Gary Gipson (EXXON) stated that the system will be re-started as soon as the water level recovers sufficient to operate the system.

3. Free product is present at MW-9, the replacement well for MW-6. Both Rick Mueller (PFD) and CMN stated the need for extraction and remediation of GW and FP at this well location. The GW extraction system should be re-installed.

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extended to operate at this location. Gary Gipsom (EXXON) appeared to agree that this was necessary.

4. A Vapor extraction system to remediate soil contamination at the site will be operational within three days. (see location map for Vapor extraction well locations).
5. As part of CAO, Two additional offsite wells NE and E of Site will be installed in the next two months (accord to offsite property was only recently acquired, finally).
6. Exxon has requested that their reporting requirements be diminished from Bimonthly reports to quarterly reports, ^{since} they are now essentially in a remedial phase of the investigation.
