I responded to a voice mail from Ms. Janice With. Ms. With had called to say the second well reported to be associated with her property was the well observed in the street and had been missed by the Hageman-Aguiar well sampling event (of 1997). I responded that I don't know if the in-street well is associated with her property, and if the in-street well was installed at the same time as the well (cover plate at least) on her property. Ms. With is convinced the in-street well is hers. I reminded her the well was observed being sampled – indicating it may belongs to another case. I also admitted that the well may be shared by more than one case.

Ms. With had a thought that the well may belong to Pacific Pipe and that was why she received a copy of the Regional Board Closure. This got me thinking about Pacific Supply, a closed LUST case across the street from Ms. With's property. While on the phone with Ms. With, I looked up Pacific Supply on GeoTracker. The most recent GWMR (2011) has a map of well locations, and there is a well, MW-7, in the location of the in-street well. MW-7 is shown on the C&L side of 24th Street near the driveway to her property. I informed Ms. With of my findings.

I mention off-handedly that the well is associated with a now-closed case and it should have been destroyed. The well is identified in the Pacific Supply (RO540) well destruction report as having been drilled out with 8-inch auger and backfilled with a cement-bentonite slurry. A site visit is on order to remove the well cover and determine if the well was drilled out through the Christy box with the cover plate replaced or if the well was not abandoned. MW-7 is (was) reported to be a 19.50-foot-deep well having a bore of 6 inches with 2-inch casing.
