Dear Mr. Murphy:

I am in receipt of the groundwater monitoring report, dated January 1997, site closure report, dated April 21, 1997 and a response letter to the questions raised by this Department on human health risk assessment, dated August 18, 1998, prepared by Aqua Geosciences, Inc. for the above mentioned site.

The risk to public health due to exposure to BTEX and MTBE (methyl tertiary butyl ether) was evaluated using ASTM's Risk Based Corrective Action Methodology (RBCA). The maximum concentrations of contaminants found in the groundwater were used to model off site residential ingestion of groundwater (although according to the report, no groundwater production wells were identified in the vicinity of the groundwater plume) and onsite inhalation of vapors in an enclosed area.

Based upon the results of the risk assessment (for a hazard index of 1 and a cancer risk of one in one hundred thousand) and with the provision that the information provided to the agency was accurate and representative of current site conditions, the site does not pose a threat to human health and no further action is needed.

Your business has been selected to receive a "pilot" hazardous waste minimization assessment. As you are probably aware, hazardous waste reduction has become a statewide, if not a national, issue. To address this issue at a county level, Alameda County is establishing its own Hazardous Waste Minimization Program and is planning to conduct waste minimization assessments for all hazardous waste generating facilities in the County.
